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Financial Review

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From the Chairperson and CEO

COVID-19-20-2021, we thought we would say it and get it out of the way. Yes, it's been a long pandemic, yes, it's had a significant impact, and yes, like everyone we hope it ends in the near future. Thankfully our staff have been amazing and have continued to provide our essential services to the vulnerable and at-risk young people that access Youth Futures. Without the dedication and commitment of our staff we would not have been able to continue to operate under what has been difficult circumstances at times.

It has been another incredible year for Youth Futures with countless highlights attributed to the dedication and hard work of our 115 paid staff and 30+ volunteers. While it's difficult to name all of the organisational highlights of 2021, we have listed a few of the main highlights including: additional services established throughout 2021, growth and development of existing services, and confirmed new services for 2022.

Additional Services

- Established an additional Transitional Accommodation Program in the City of Canning (TAP South), increasing our homeless services by 8 beds
- Established our fourth Anchor Point site in Mirrabooka
- Established a Drug Education Support Service to support students in Youth Futures Community Schools

Service Growth and Development

- Expanded the Multicultural Youth Settlement Program
- Restructured Youth Futures Community School Caversham Campus and employed a new Deputy Principal
- Established a formal partnership with Motivation Foundation, including a new West Swan Campus delivering Certificate II in Civil Construction
- Secured a contract extension and restructured the Altone Youth Centre

Approved Additional Services 2022

- Secured funding for Pathways, a new employment/education transitions program
- Secured funding from the State Government to replicate TINOCA in Merriwa
- Secured funding from the State Government to expand the Comet Connect Program in the northern suburbs
- Purchased a new property to establish a Youth Futures Community School Junior Campus in Merriwa

As an organisation, our greatest highlight for 2021 is that we have assisted over 3,100 young people across the 32 services operated under Youth Futures, **an incredible 86% increase** from what we achieved in 2019. This incredible achievement is a credit to all involved with the organisation, from our amazing staff and volunteers to our generous funders and supporters.

What's even more incredible is that over 2,000 of these young people were **supported on multiple occasions** over an extended period of time, from weekly sessions to 140 hours of support a week. We believe our intensive support is why the young people accessing our services overcome such adversity and achieve so much.

Our Homelessness Services supported **262 young people experiencing homelessness** throughout the year via our 7 homelessness services. This was a **decrease of 22%** from last year, which is directly attributed to young people staying in our homelessness services for longer periods due to Covid and the affordable housing crisis in Perth. With vacancy rates at some of the lowest ever recorded, combined with record rent rates and increases, many young people have simply been locked out of the housing market. Throughout the year we also received an **additional 1,108 requests for help** and support from young people experiencing homelessness that we were unable to assist.

As an organisation we have spent many years planning, developing and implementing a number of services and programs to create our personcentred holistic model. We know that providing a range of services to young people, from a single location where they are already supported, reduces barriers to engagement and significantly increases positive outcomes. Our 14 Wellbeing and Support Services provided help and support to 1,922 young people throughout 2021, an increase of 15% from 2020. We have been extremely successful in increasing our capacity at several sites and have several projects planned for the coming year to further increase our capacity as an organisation.

Not only will we look to increase our internal capacity through service expansion and the creation of new services, we will also look for ways to increase our capacity through partnerships, all with the aim of providing more support and increasing positive outcomes for young people.

In the 2021 school year, **373 young people were** enrolled through Youth Futures Community School, Anchor Point and Comet Connect. The Literacy Learning Support Program supported **110 young people and 328 young people were** supported with appropriate curriculum by our Registered Training Organisation. Overall, our Education and Training Services enabled students to achieve the following:

- 2,434 Units completed (CGEA I, II, III)
- 130 Certificates achieved (CGEA I, II, III)
- 16 Certificate II Civil Construction achieved
- 178 Additional courses completed

We continue to see hundreds of young people overcome challenges, obstacles and achieve amazing outcomes as a result of being supported by our staff and participating in the many programs and services offered by Youth Futures. Seeing the lives of young people change and witnessing their achievements, reinforces our dedication and commitment to continue helping some of the most disengaged, disadvantaged and vulnerable young people in our community.

As our reputation for delivering professional, outcome-achieving youth services has continued to grow, unfortunately, so has the number of referrals we receive that we are not able to support.

Whilst over the last few years we have been extremely successful in increasing our capacity, we know there is more we can do as an organisation. That's why we have set some ambitious plans for the first half of 2022. These include the following:

"Youth Futures is like my second family to me, thank you for everything"



Homelessness Services

We believe every young person has the right to safe, secure accommodation and that an experience of homelessness does not define them or their future.

Guided by this belief, we offer a range of accommodation and support services for young people experiencing, or at-risk of, homelessness. We know that secure housing can help a young person thrive, but that it takes much more than just a roof overhead to break the cycle of homelessness. That's why, as a team, we are passionate about assisting each young person to identify their goals and providing them with the tailored, holistic support to make them a reality.

TINOCA

Built in 1988 as a community response to young people experiencing homelessness, TINOCA provides shortterm accommodation for young people aged 15-19 who are experiencing homelessness or are unable to stay in their family home. Located in Perth's northern suburbs, TINOCA provides young people with a safe place to call home where they can access support to stabilise their life and plan their future. From the essentials, such as food and shelter, to working through mental health challenges and/or drug use, TINOCA's staff provide tailored support to residents.

Due to the affordable housing crisis in 2021, longerterm housing, including public, private and community options, experienced severely increased wait lists. This made it exceptionally challenging to secure safe, ongoing accommodation for young people transitioning out of our services.

TINOCA operates near capacity throughout the year. With a huge increase in population but no increase in youth accommodation services in Perth's northern corridor, many young people cannot be accommodated. **50** young people accommodated this year

9 out of 10 young people were unable to access TINOCA due to high demand

However, with funding for a second crisis accommodation service, plus six more transitional accommodation properties we will soon be able to house more young people.

Laura's Story

Laura, 15, was referred to TINOCA by staff at Youth Futures Community School as she was couch surfing between friends and family. Laura lived with her birth parents until she was 13, however, during this time her mother was incarcerated for 2 years, and her father passed away. Between the ages of 13-15 Laura continued to live with her mother and her mother's new partner. During this time Laura experienced physical and verbal abuse from her mother's partner. At the age of 15, following a physical altercation, Laura decided to leave her mother's house and stay with extended family members. However, due to continuing family conflict Laura would couch surf between her extended family members and friends' houses.

Throughout Laura's stay at TINOCA she actively engaged with both the Youth Worker and the Drug Education Support Worker to work towards achieving her goals. During her stay Laura obtained income through Centrelink to support herself; Completed her Cert II in General Education and begun her Cert III in General Education through Youth Futures Community School; reduced her Cannabis and Tobacco use; and engaged in mental health support through a private psychologist.

Due to Laura being 15 when she was accommodated in TINOCA she was unable to transition into longterm accommodation (tenancies are only permitted to over 16's).

As a result of this Laura remained in the service for 7 months until she turned 16 and was able to access long-term accommodation. We're happy to report that Laura continued to engage in schooling and appointments with her psychologist upon exit of TINOCA and is doing well living independently.






Transitional Accommodation Program (TAP)

TAP offers housing and support to young people aged 16 to 21. Individual properties spread across the Perth metropolitan area accommodate one to three young people at a time.

Young people staying in our TAP properties live independently with support and regular visits from a Youth Worker who helps them overcome challenges and make a plan for their future; whether that be enrolling in education, gaining employment, setting saving goals, or securing future accommodation.

With over 200 requests for TAP housing that we were unable to accommodate in 2021, the program will expand in 2022 with additional properties, allowing us to accommodate 8 more young people experiencing homelessness. Additionally, the program will provide outreach support which will assist young people in navigating the steps needed to achieve independent living and successful futures.



Youth Place

Located in Fremantle and delivered in partnership with St Patrick's Community Support Centre, Youth Place provides supported housing to young people aged 15 to 25 who are experiencing or at-risk of homelessness. Accommodation is provided for up to 12 months, during which time a Youth Worker will support individuals to explore long-term housing options and personal goals.

Outreach support is available for those unable to be accommodated, aiding with securing alternative housing options and assisting individuals to work through challenges such as mental health, drug use and/or family breakdown. 31 young people and children stayed at a Youth Place house64 young people supported through outreach services

Housing Support Worker – North Metro

Our dedicated Housing Support Worker supports individuals, couples and families aged 16 to 25 who are leaving homelessness services and require additional support to secure long-term housing. The flexible program supports young people to work through personal challenges and develop an action plan to achieve long-term housing, education, employment and financial goals. The service provides support, advocacy, referral and case management, with the end goal of long-term housing for young people and a successful tenancy.

Housing Support Worker - Corrective Services

This program helps young people aged 16-18 who are experiencing homelessness, or at-risk of homelessness upon exiting the justice system, by giving them the support they need for a fresh start. Young people on a community-based order or exiting juvenile detention can access the support of a Housing Support Worker with the main aim to achieve a long-term tenancy that they're able to maintain. Additionally, the Housing Support Worker can advocate for the young person, support them to develop independent living skills such as cooking, cleaning and budgeting, and guide them to overcome financial hardship and family challenges. Once long-term housing is found, the Housing Support Worker will work with the young person to establish their new home and can continue to provide support for a further 12 months.

It is evident that once a young person gains stability through their accommodation they can achieve goals that they may not have been able to achieve previously. Recidivism is reduced by providing the stability needed to help individuals achieve their goals allowing the young person to return to the community as a positive member of society. 37 young parents and children were supported

Ben's Story

Attempting to end his life at 17, following years of physical abuse from his stepfather, Ben, 19 was looking for support with long-term accommodation for himself and his pregnant partner. At the time Ben was actively working through drug use and mental health challenges which continued to impact his housing opportunities. With support from the program Ben engaged in professional mental health services and gained employment. It was clear that both were a positive pathway for Ben; his mental health improved and he expressed excitement at having responsibility at his work and being part of a team. Ben and his partner welcomed their baby girl and were supported to receive Bond Loan support from the Department of Communities to secure a private rental in Midland. The family remain in the property, are maintaining the tenancy and doing well personally. Due to attaining a private rental, the family were able to be removed from the National Partnership Agreement on Homelessness list. Since moving into the property, ceasing drug use and finding stability, Ben was supported to receive his provisional driving licence making travelling to work every day easier. Additionally, Ben has been able to rekindle a supportive relationship with his Dad.

The Nest

The Nest program provides intensive support to young parents, 16-19-years old, who are at-risk of losing custody of their baby due to homelessness or escaping domestic violence. In addition to being provided accommodation, parents are supported to tackle personal challenges, such as poor physical and mental health, troubled family relationships, and experiences of abuse or domestic violence, whilst becoming a new parent. They are also assisted to connect with the community through child health nurses, playgroups/mothers' group aiding them to build their support network and ensure that their baby reaches developmental milestones. The holistic program supports young parents to develop their parenting, financial, and independent living skills to maintain a long-term tenancy and ensure they can care for their family independently in the future.





Support Services

We are passionate about helping young people overcome the barriers preventing them from reaching their potential and aim to support them in the most holistic way we can.

Emergency Relief

Our Emergency Relief program supports young people aged 15-24 who are experiencing financial hardship. Delivered from our Head Office in Joondalup, Youth Place in Fremantle, Altone Youth Centre in Beechboro and through a partnership with Swan City Youth Service in Midland the program has wide reach and impact.

Emergency Relief consists of hampers filled with urgent essentials such as food, personal hygiene items, transport passes and supermarket vouchers. It is also a vital engagement tool allowing us to engage the young person in meaningful conversation, support them through our other programs or link them to external services, where appropriate.

Drug Education and Support Services (DESS)

Young people engaged in our Homelessness Services can participate in private counselling or group sessions to discuss alcohol/drug use. The DESS program provides a safe space for young people to discuss current challenges in their lives with a professional who can provide them with accurate information on topics such as harm minimisation strategies and mental health.



Due to the success of this program in our Homelessness Service, we sought funding to replicate the offering across our education sites. Commencing in January 2021, students in our Education Services have engaged well in the program. Students are benefiting from accessing accurate information in a non-judgemental space, which we believe will reduce drug and alcohol use and related crimes among those supported.

Keys 2 Employment

A driver's licence can open doors to education, training and employment. It also promotes independence.

Our Keys 2 Employment program is delivered from our Youth Futures Community School campuses and in partnership with Balga Senior High School. The program assists young people to successfully navigate the licencing system, including the completion of their logbook. Without this program young people may struggle to get their licence due to financial difficulties or the lack of a responsible adult to teach them.





Youth Needs Assessment Service (YNAS)

150 young people supported
1112 clinical sessions held with young people
187 sessions held for parents

We know from research that most young people who experience mental health challenges do not access psychological support. There are several reasons for this, including stigma, distrust of services, financial and practical barriers to access, in addition to extensive waitlists or specific intake criteria which they do not meet. These barriers are magnified for disadvantaged young people, those with trauma histories, and minority groups.

Our Youth Needs Assessment Service provides mental health support to young people already engaged in a Youth Futures program. A team of Clinical Psychologists ensure that young people are able to access support in a timely manner and in an environment they are already comfortable in. Shorter waiting periods reduce the risk of a young person's mental health deteriorating further whilst they wait for support and having the service in-house increases the young person's willingness to engage in the service.

The Youth Needs Assessment Service works from a client centred framework. By providing young people with an accessible, youth friendly mental health service without fees or waitlists, we aim to make a young person's experience with mental health services a positive one. In addition to addressing their current difficulties, this hopefully sets young people on a path where they are not afraid to access mental health services if they need them later in their lives.

"Working as a psychologist alongside Youth Workers, Teachers and Trainers, I see the needs of young people being met at multiple levels - from needs at an individual level, expanding outwards to needs at a more systemic level. This model allows for a more fluid, coordinated and holistic mental health support. It is incredibly rewarding to be able to work from this angle and to be part of this wrap-around support that can have a lasting impact in multiple domains of life."

Youth Settlement Services

Youth Futures is proud to be part of the Welcome Hub, delivered in partnership with four other organisations: City of Stirling, Metropolitan Migrant Resource Centre (MMRC), Ishar Multicultural Women's Health Services, and Association for Torture and Trauma Survivors (ASeTTS). The Welcome Hub is an integrated service model with a one-stop settlement shop based at the Herb Graham Recreation Centre, Mirrabooka.

We have a dedicated Youth Support and Development Worker providing a Youth Settlement Service supporting young refugees aged 12-25 who have immigrated to Australia in the past 5 years.

This service supports newly arrived young people to improve their wellbeing, independence and community connectedness; offering one-on-one intensive support, information sessions and recreational activities like art workshops, sport and camps.



Altone Youth Centre

Altone Youth Centre, located in Beechboro, is a one-stopshop for local young people, aged 11-24. Delivering a mix of drop-in and structured sessions throughout the year, young people can come along to a safe place to hang out after school, use computers, grab a meal or engage in meaningful conversation with a Youth Worker. Group workshops are delivered throughout the year to support life skill development and educate young people on topics relevant to maintaining good health and wellbeing.

With in-house Youth Workers, young people have access to informal counselling, practical support, advocacy, case management and referrals to additional support services. Working closely with the local community, schools and the City of Swan over the past thirty years, Altone Youth Centre is a well utilised and trusted service.

Education and Training Services

At Youth Futures we believe that education is the key to opportunity but understand that mainstream school isn't for everyone and every person's path to success is unique.

Young people attending our education programs have faced many barriers to education including bullying, mental health challenges, learning difficulties, and homelessness, to name just a few. We offer young people a range of education options appropriate to them, provided in flexible and supportive environments with an approach that is tailored to the individual need of each student. Our alternative education options are registered with the Department of Education; Youth Futures Community School as Curriculum and Re-Engagement in Education (CaRE) Schools and Anchor Point as a Community Based Course (gazetted by the Department of Education). Futures Education and Training Services (FEAT), our Registered Training Organisation (RTO 52833), provides the assessment and qualifications for all programs.



Nationally Accredited

Students complete a nationally accredited course.

Holistic Approach

It's not all about book work. Students have access to youth workers, a literacy coach and a psychologist.



Life Skills

Our students leave with skills that will help them succeed in life; including budgeting, cooking, job-seeking and interview skills.



Self-paced Learning Students can enrol at any time of the year and complete their courses at their own pace.

Tailored Learning We know that young people learn in different ways. That's

High Ratio

To make sure each student gets the support they need we have 1 staff member for every 7 students.



Anchor Point

Our Anchor Point program provides disengaged young people aged 15-19, with an appropriate alternative to traditional high school. Delivered four days a week at four sites, Ballajura, Bayswater, Mirrabooka and Joondalup, we offer students a flexible, youth-friendly environment where they can complete their Certificate I, II or III in General Education for Adults (22472VIC, 22473VIC and 22474VIC) with one-on-one holistic support focusing on personal development, work readiness, health and wellbeing. This approach allows the students to learn at their own pace and reengage with education in a manner best suited to their circumstance.





Literacy Learning and Support Program (LLSP)

Through our education programs we identified many young people needing additional intensive and individualised support before they could complete a nationally accredited course. Following the successful pilot of the LLSP in 2018/19 we now have a team of literacy officers working across our education sites. Providing one-on-one support to students displaying significantly lower literacy and numeracy skills than their peers, the program ensures that young people have the skills they need to start and successfully complete their Certificate I in General Education for Adults.

Education in Partnership

In partnership, Youth Futures Community School, the Motivation Foundation and Australian Training Management (ATM), provide young people aged 17-19, with an alternative to traditional high school and a route into industry jobs through innovative solutions to education.

Together we offer students a flexible environment to complete Certificates in General Education, at their own pace, alongside a trade qualification with any extra tailored support needed to reach their potential.

Jack's Story

Jack joined Youth Futures Community School Caversham in 2019 after having been home schooled for the previous 2 years. After attending full-time for 6 months at Caversham he then enrolled in the Certificate II in Civil Construction at the Motivation Foundation; working one day a week towards this certificate while still studying his Certificate I in General Education for Adults (CGEA).

Past trauma in Jack's life had caused him some mental health challenges and led him to need support with his social and emotional wellbeing. Engaging with both the Youth Worker and Clinical Psychologists on-site he was able to remain focussed on his studies whilst gaining the support he needed.

Jack was supported by Youth Futures Community School staff to develop life skills which would assist him at the end of his education. This included practical support to create a resume and cover letter, apply for a Tax File Number and work towards gaining his driver's license. Jack undertook weekly driving lessons when available and was proactive in gaining his driving hours outside of school, with the aim of getting his licence by time he completed his certificates to increase his employability prospects.

Jack was one of the first students to make the transition to the new West Swan campus to study both qualifications at one site and we're pleased to say he successfully completed both his CGEA and Civil Construction Certificates at the end of 2021.

Jack was fortunate enough to gain employment just prior to the graduation from the Motivation Foundation and is excelling in his chosen field of Civil Construction, working for ERTECH on major road projects around Perth.



Youth Futures Community School

For young people who are ready for a more structured classroom environment than Anchor Point, our Youth Futures Community Schools offer students a flexible learning environment with a larger curriculum focus. Academic attainment is complemented with holistic care ensuring students receive the wrap-around, holistic, support needed to reach their potential. Our staff include a unique mix of Teachers, Trainers, Youth Workers, Clinical Psychologists, and support staff.

We acknowledge that young people learn in different ways and that everyone brings with them different strengths and challenges. Together we support young people to overcome their personal barriers and assist them to create an education plan that is achievable and meaningful for them. Above all, we are respectful, non-judgemental, and passionate about the work we do.

Our Vision

Communities where all young people can access an appropriate education.

Our Mission

To provide young people with a safe and encouraging learning environment where they can attain an education and receive support that leads to independent living.



Youth Futures Community Schools exist to provide an alternative setting to mainstream education for students in Years 8-12 who have been unable to successfully access education at conventional schools.

Central to the schools' success is effectively fostering excellent relationships between school staff, students and their families. These relationships are based on empathy, respect and trust, which underpin the learning process.

Operating 5 days a week from five campuses, Albany, Caversham, Clarkson, Midland and West Swan all campuses deliver a highly student-centred learning model with much of the learning self-paced and based on individual needs, rather than students having to conform to an inflexible educational model which may not meet their requirements.

Students have access to VET learning pathways including Certificates in General Education for Adults I, II and III (22472VIC, 22473VIC and 22474VIC), in addition to industry specific qualifications. To supplement educational attainments, students are supported with their journey to future pathways and assisted to transition to employment through numerous work experience opportunities, TAFE courses, apprenticeships and traineeships.

Academic achievements are complemented with experiences to develop social skills required to be successful in the workplace as well as practical and independent life skills such as Keys 4 Life, attaining driving licences and acquiring WHS certificates and White cards.

Principal's Address

At the start of 2021 all Comet schools rebranded to Youth Futures Community School. This change in name unified our school campuses and reflects our parent organisation Youth Futures who provides holistic support to our students through a myriad of programs. The rebrand meant our students got their hands on some new school hoodies and polo shirts which have great currency – especially in winter.

The school year started a little later than expected due to COVID-19, however staff and students, now being well versed in online learning and technological substitutes, managed the situation very well. Aside from some mask wearing, the rest of the school year was relatively smooth sailing and we were witness to some wonderful student achievements.

2021 saw the extension of support services on offer at our Schools with the addition of in-house Literacy Officers, Psychologists and a Drug Education Support Service. Our teaching staff also increased as new classrooms were opened at two campuses, allowing the school to reduce waiting lists and service more young people. New classrooms were also added at our West Swan campus, where students study certificates in Civil Construction with the Motivation Foundation and acquire employment on completion of their qualification. This has been a fantastic opportunity for over 30 students this year, many of whom have already begun work in their new careers.

In addition to completing Certificates in General Education for Adults, students also attained White Cards, learners permits and driver's licences, all of which improve employability and independence. Many students also embarked on traineeships, apprenticeships and TAFE courses, as well as moving directly into employment.

Students enjoyed participating in a range of community and charity activities, from environmental and graffiti clean ups, charity teas and bake sales to Youth Futures own Pipeline Challenge event. Missed in 2020 due to COVID-19, this year students and staff were excited to participate in the 5-day mountain bike ride from Kalgoorlie to Perth following the famous Golden Pipeline. This event, which is a gruelling challenge for all, and a fantastic achievement for students, raised over \$164,000 for Youth Futures Nest program which provides accommodation for young parents and their infants escaping domestic violence and experiencing homelessness. The six Youth Futures Community School students who attended enjoyed contributing to the cause as much as the activity itself.

Student development and achievement at the school was again heart-warming and every year it is wonderful to look back and see how much our students have developed, academically and personally. Many of our 2021 students have moved on to the next step in their journey, into TAFE, employment, traineeships or apprenticeships, including 16 students from the West Swan campus acquiring full-time employment in industry. I congratulate all students on their individual achievements throughout the school year and sincerely wish you all the best for 2022 and the years to come.

Comet Connect

The name Comet comes from the acronym of Community Outreach Model of Education and Training. As such, Comet Connect is a mobile learning space taking education to some of the community's most vulnerable young people.

Our mobile classroom is a custom fit minibus with dedicated Trainer and is decked out with everything a student needs to access education. The service meets young people at their preferred location, whether that's at home or at a safe public space like the local library; with the session taking place inside or outside the vehicle. Comparable to our Youth Futures Community Schools, students can study Certificates in General Education for Adults at a pace which suits them. In addition to accessing education, students can obtain support through our Clinical Psychologists, Literacy Officer and other support services delivered by the organisation in addition to obtaining referrals to external support services, where needed.

Despite studying away from our campuses, Comet Connect students can choose to attend sessions in the minibus on school grounds and are invited to School events; both in a bid to reengage in on-site education, build their confidence and foster social skills with other students.

Throughout 2021, the program operated at capacity, with students and family members alike commending the service for its innovation and flexibility. Following the success of Comet Connect in 2020 and 2021 we have bought a second minibus and plan to expand the service.

Delilah's Story

Delilah spent two years searching for an appropriate education pathway before being referred to Comet Connect. In those two years she attempted several mainstream schools and a range of alternative education options, none aligning to the personal challenges she was facing. Missing valuable social, emotional, and academic development and milestones Delilah was however, determined to engage in education.

First enrolling in the Anchor Point program, Delilah was excited and speaks fondly of her time there however, due to mental health challenges she was unable to meet the attendance requirements. Delilah seemed to have given up hope that she would be able to reengage into a program that she genuinely enjoyed even though she was desperately trying to get her education. Anchor Point made an internal referral to Comet Connect and it seemed to be the perfect fit for Delilah's circumstances.

Four months in, Delilah is engaging well in Comet Connect, even completing the optional engagement tasks, which has seen her confidence increase. Often indulging in conversations about her past or talking about her favourite subjects she does so with a great sense of humour and making her love of learning evident.

Studying her Certificate I in General Education for Adults, she has just completed her very first unit and is halfway through an English book, demonstrating her wonderful writing skills. It is evident that Delilah is an extremely bright young mind who just needed a bit of time and space to spark her love of education in a safe setting. With an aptitude for art, Delilah has been researching TAFE programs which will foster her talents, to move onto after Comet Connect.



Futures Education and Training Services (FEAT)

FEAT is a Registered Training Organisation (RTO 52833) assessing nationally recognised qualifications delivered through Youth Futures education programs Anchor Point, Comet Connect and Youth Futures Community Schools (years 10, 11 and 12).

Qualifications delivered are:



We'd like to offer a special acknowledgement to our top individual fundraiser Steve Stanbrook whose efforts equated to providing a young mum and bub safe housing and support for over 4 months!

Thank you to our team of volunteers and corporate sponsors without whom the event would not be possible. As our flagship event we are all keen to get back in the saddle this May and grind some more gravel for a good cause - Pipeline Challenge 2022 here we come!





Starting Young

Meet 10-year-old Grace, one of our youngest and most innovative supporters. Fundraising for Youth Futures since 2019 Grace said she wanted to use her privilege and influence to support those less fortunate. Using her school community to raise awareness and engaging her peers in fundraising and donation efforts, Grace has successfully donated over \$3000 and numerous stacks of donated items.

Our Dedication to the Youth Work Sector

Each year we host around 25 students, supporting them to complete their 150-400 hours of practical placement associated with their formal study. Over the years we have formed mutually beneficial partnerships with ECU and North Metro TAFE allowing us to contribute to the creation of a professional youth work sector and therefore invest in the following students:

- Certificate IV in Youth Work
- Diploma of Youth Work
- Bachelor of Youth Work

Throughout the placement, students understudy some of the best Youth Workers in the sector, in a diverse range of roles, giving them insight and wide experience into youth work in practice. Upon completion of their hours many students are offered casual paid work with us or alternatively they view us as their employer of choice for the future. Fifteen of our current staff have been recruited in this manner which has allowed us to save valuable funds by not having to advertise externally.

For staff supervising students on placement there are also many benefits. It gives staff an opportunity to develop their leadership skills and implement their reflective practice allowing for continuous improvement. Working alongside potential future colleagues ensures high standards are maintained and helps foster working relationships built on trust – essential for positive working environments. Entrusting staff to develop future youth workers instils pride in their work and gives them professional development opportunities to advance their own career.

By hosting student placements we're supporting the continuation of Youth Work qualifications and increasing professional standards by encouraging membership to the professional association Youth Work WA. All of which ultimately contributes to outstanding support for young people.

Youth Futures Community School have operated on a calandar year reporting period since being established. All future financial reports for the Organisation will cover a calandar year reporting period.

Reliance Auditing was appointed for the years 2020 and 2021. Naz Randeria the Managing Director, brings a wealth of knowledge and years of experience in auditing.




